16 universities have been selected from India for the tie-up

The Kerala Agricultural University (KAU) has entered into an MoU with the Western Sydney University (WSU) for collaborative programmes in education and researc's.

KAU Vice-Ch ncellor signed the MoU at nunction held in Bengalur Thursday. The University of Agricultural Sciences (UAS), Bengaluru; UAS Dharward; and Tamil Nadu Agricultural University (TNAU), Coimbatore; also entered into pact with the WSU along with the KAU.
